SOCIAL HOSTING AND UNDERAGE DRINKING



The Facts

- Social hosting refers to hosting a party or gathering where alcohol is available.
- It's illegal for an adult to provide alcohol to persons younger than 21 or allow minors to consume alcohol on that adult's property if the adult is not a parent or guardian of those minors.
- Parents who allow their children to invite friends to a party with alcohol

 even if supervised — could face criminal charges and civil penalties.
- Social hosting laws are designed to protect minors and the community from the sometimes deadly consequences of underage drinking.



The Consequences

Civil Penalties

You can face civil penalties for damages caused by a minor younger than 18 if you:

- Knowingly served or provided any alcohol that contributed to their intoxication.
- Or knowingly allowed them to be served or provided any alcohol that contributed to the minor's intoxication on property owned or leased by you.

Criminal Charges

You can face a Class A Misdemeanor, punishable by:

- A fine up to \$4,000; and/or
- Up to one year in jail; and
- suspension, or denial of issuance, of his/her driver's license.
- Note: Only applies if you are not the minor's parent, spouse or legal guardian.



Tips for Prevention

- Don't try to create house rules, take car keys or ask permission from other parents to serve alcohol. You'll still be held responsible!
- Celebrate major milestones and events without alcohol, like with a concert, day at the theme park or camping trip.
- Be a model for making healthy choices.
